Findings from Injury Prevention Research in Nova Scotia



COMMUNICATION AND COLLABORATION



Education

When asked what is the most important thing that could be done to \injuries associated with OHV use, \taucation and awareness was the top answer.



Enforcement

Lack of OHV enforcement was a concern for most, **78% of survey respondents never or rarely** saw an enforcement officer in the past 2 years.



OHV Policies

Some informants felt existing OHV policies were sufficient - they just need enhanced enforcement. Others suggested a review given exemptions, 'loopholes' and inconsistencies across Canada.



Environment/Engineering

Improvements to both trail design and maintenance as well as improvements in OHV technology/design were suggested as ways to reduce OHV-related injuries. Trail connectivity, allowing the safe passage from trail-to-trail or trail to services, was also noted as a way to improve rider safety.
